Report of the Chair- Nominations Committee Slates

 Across the nation, higher education institutions are confronting escalating political pressures that threaten academic freedom, institutional autonomy, and the foundational principles of our educational system. Recent developments have made it clear that academic communities must actively reaffirm their core values.



• In response to these challenges, the Senate Executive Committee voted on April 9, 2025, to convene a subcommittee to review public statements issued by peer institutions, including Rutgers University, and to consider whether the University of Maryland should vote to adopt a formal resolution of its own.



- Members agreed to vote on the subcommittee slate via email.



PCC Proposal to Establish a Bachelor of Arts in Global Cultures (Senate Document #24-25-30) (Action)

- The College of Arts and Humanities' School of Languages, Literatures, and Cultures proposes to establish a Bachelor of Arts in Global Cultures.
- This undergraduate major will foster the multilingual study of the cultures of the globalized world through classroom and experiential learning.



 Unlike traditional language bachelor's programs, which separate language acquisition from cultural study, this BA program allows students to explore culture alongside or prior to language study and engage in the advanced study of more than one language.





- The 39-credit major includes two core courses in global humanities, 12 credits in language study, 6 credits in experiential learning, and 15 credits of upper-division electives.
- The program may be paired with another language major or any other major.



• The Global Cultures program aligns with the university's strategic goals by reimagining learning through interdisciplinary, experiential, and globally focused education that prepares students to address humanity's grand challenges.





 The program will draw on the physical facilities, administrative infrastructure and instructional resources already available within the School of Languages, Literatures, and Cultures and the College of Arts and Humanities.

 The School of Public Policy, in conjunction with its campus partners, proposes to establish a Bachelor of Arts in Global and Foreign Policy.





PCC Proposal to Establish a Bachelor of Arts in Global and Foreign Policy (Senate Document #24-25-31)

 This program is designed to address the growing demand for interdisciplinary education that equips students to navigate the complex challenges of global governance, international conflict, diplomacy, development, and sustainability.





PCC Proposal to Establish a Bachelor of Arts in Global and Foreign Policy (Senate Document #24-25-31)

• The interdisciplinary Global and Foreign Policy major will be housed in the School of Public Policy but will be collaboratively offered with the School of Languages, Literatures, and Cultures, the Department of History, and the Department of Agricultural and Resource Economics.





 The program will be 52-53 credits, and include core courses in global policy and ethics, pluralism and public policy, and history, 16-27 credits in skill-based coursework in statistics, research methods, and world languages, a 15-credit thematic track with electives, and an experiential learning component.



 Graduates of this major will be prepared for careers in government, international organizations, NGOs, think tanks, global businesses, and other sectors that address international policy, diplomacy, development, and security issues.





• The program will be funded through internal reallocations as it leverages existing faculty, courses, and infrastructure within the School of Public Policy and its collaborating partners to offer the program.

6. PCC Proposal to Establish a Master of Science in Artificial Intelligence (Senate Document #24-25-32) (Action)

- The College of Computer, Mathematical, and Natural Sciences proposes to establish a Master of Science in Artificial Intelligence.
- This 30-credit, non-thesis program is designed for professionals seeking advanced training in AI technologies.





 The curriculum emphasizes technical proficiency in machine learning, deep learning, and AI decisionmaking, while also addressing human-centered design, ethics, and the societal impact of AI.





• The program includes 21 credits of core courses in probability and statistics, data science, machine learning, computer systems, and the social and ethical aspects of AI, along with a 9-credit elective category that will allow students to focus on a particular area of AI.



- The program is designed to meet the growing demand for professionals trained in both the technical and social dimensions of AI.
- The program will be self-supported and funded entirely through tuition revenue.





- The proposal was approved by the Senate Programs, Curricula, and Courses Committee at its meeting on April 4, 2025.
- The Program, Curricula, and Courses Committee moves that the proposal to establish a Master of Science in Artificial Intelligence be approved.

PCC Proposal to Establish a Bachelor of Arts in Public Service Interpreting and Translation (Senate Document #24-25-33) (Action)

- The College of Arts and Humanities proposes to establish a Bachelor of Arts in Public Service Interpreting and Translation.
- This program will be a collaboration between the Department of Communication and the School of Languages, Literatures, and Cultures, and will be offered at the Universities at Shady Grove.



 The program will provide students with a fundamental understanding of how to communicate messages between speakers of one language and speakers of a different language through the spoken (interpreting) and written word (translation) in community-based settings.





- The program is designed for speakers of Spanish and English with particular focus on heritage speakers of Spanish.
- This program will address the state of Maryland's growing need for trained Spanish-English interpreters and translators by equipping bilingual students with the skills and credentials to serve diverse communities.





 The 45-credit program includes lower-level communication courses, intercultural communication theory and methods, interpretation and translation (including a practicum), upperlevel communication courses, and upper-level Spanish courses.





- Though the course focuses on Spanish-speakers now, the hope is to add more language opportunities in the future, and thus the title of the course remains open, allowing for this growth.
- Graduates will be equipped to work in education, healthcare, law, migrant services, and other public sectors where bilingual communication is essential.



- This program will be self-funded through tuition revenue, and will be supported by existing faculty and administrative infrastructure in the participating departments.
- The proposal was approved by the Senate Programs, Curricula, and Courses Committee at its meeting on April 4, 2025.
- The Program, Curricula, and Courses Committee recommends that the proposal to establish a Bachelor of Arts in Public Service Interpreting and Translation be approved.

8. APAS Report: Review of UMD Policy on Excused Absence [V-1.00 (G)] (Senate Document #24-25-10) (Action)

• In October 2024, the Senate Executive Committee (SEC) charged the Academic Procedures and Standards (APAS) Committee with a review of the University of Maryland (UMD) Policy on Excused Absence (V-1.00(G)) after a Senator expressed a concern about possible misalignment between UMD's policy and a University Systems of Maryland (USM) policy, which had been updated in December 2024.



 At the October 2024 APAS Committee meeting, members reviewed the UMD Policy on Excused Absences and the USM policy Concerning the Scheduling of Academic Assignments on Dates of Religious Observance; Campus Space for Faith-Based or Religious Practices (III-5.10).





- Members identified that the first sentence of section III in the UMD Policy contains a direct quotation that is no longer present in the USM Policy.
- The committee agreed that a UMD Policy change should remove the direct quote and be broadened by referring to the USM Policy without directly quoting the policy to avoid any misquotes should future USM updates occur.



- With that change of the policy language, committee members observed that UMD's Excused Absence Policy is in alignment with the updated USM Policy based on the following points:
 - the UMD Excused Absence Policy states that events related to religious observances are considered an excused absence that receive academic accommodations, and,
 - should a student be denied an excused absence, the UMD Policy contains the process to appeal a denied excused absence or denied accommodations for an excused absence.

 Consultations were held with the Office of General Counsel (OGC), the Undergraduate Ombuds Officer, and the Faculty Affairs Committee members to gather feedback about concerns regarding potential misalignment between the two policies or concerns with implementation of the policy. No concerns were voiced among any of the constituents.





- APAS Committee members discussed concerns about a student's ability to successfully complete a course if a substantial number of classes or assignments are missed.
- Policy language was included directing students to consult with their instructor and academic advisor for extra guidance.





- Additionally, after receiving further guidance from OGC, policy language was also included to provide a clearer framework about reasonable accommodations. This language is in alignment with USM Policy language about reasonable accommodations.
- The Academic Procedures and Standards Committee recommends that the proposed revisions to the University of Maryland Policy on Excused Absence (V-1.00(G)), as shown in the report be accepted.

9. APAS Report: Proposal for Bereavement Policies and Practices Toward an Inclusive Community of Care (Senate Document # 23-24-27) (Action)

APAS Report: Proposal for Bereavement Policies and Practices Toward an Inclusive Community of Care (Senate Document # 23-24-27) (Action)

- In December 2023, University of Maryland (UMD) doctoral students submitted a proposal entitled, "Proposal for Bereavement Policies and Practices Towards an Inclusive Community of Care."
- The proposal highlighted the prevalence and impact of bereavement among college students, noting that a significant portion of college students experience the death of someone close to them.





APAS Report: Proposal for Bereavement Policies and Practices Toward an Inclusive Community of Care (Senate Document # 23-24-27)

- In the proposal, the proposers explained that the UMD Policy on Excused Absence (V-1.00[G]) allows for bereavement-related absences under "compelling circumstances;" however, the policy lacks specific guidelines for accommodations, leaving decisions to individual instructors.
- The proposal asked for a review and redesign of the University's policies to ensure clear, compassionate, and inclusive support for students while also providing instructors with guidance on how to respond effectively.





- In February 2024, the Senate Executive Committee (SEC) charged the Academic Procedures and Standards (APAS) Committee with a review of the University of Maryland (UMD) Policy on Excused Absence (V-1.00(G)).
- The APAS Committee began its review at the May 2024 committee meeting. The committee began with an analysis of BIG10 universities and peer institutions' policies and procedures.



 Through this review, members noticed that the majority of policies state that students are expected to inform the instructor of the need for an excused absence and the instructor has the discretion of how to academically accommodate the excused absence. Another trend was that, if a number of days are quantified in a policy, five days is the average amount a student can miss for the death of family members specified as a parent or sibling.



- Other immediate family members, such as grandparents, uncle/aunt, and cousins receive a fewer number of days. A few institutions centralized the process with the Dean of Students, removing faculty involvement.
- In comparison to the peer data reviewed, committee members observed that the University's current policy is more flexible than many peer institutions, which can accommodate various circumstances but lacks specifics for implementation.



- For a better understanding of how bereavement absences are addressed with the current policy, the committee sought feedback from stakeholders across campus, including:
 - The authors of the proposal
 - The Senate Student Affairs Committee
 - The Dean of Undergraduate Studies
 - The Undergraduate and the Graduate Ombuds Officers,
 - Seven Directors of Undergraduate Studies





 The committee also consulted with the University Counseling Center Director, the Dean of Students, the Office of Faculty Affairs, and the Director of Letter and Sciences, who works with a large population of undergraduate students through academic advising. Finally, the committee administered a survey to all Directors of Undergraduate Studies.





 The consultations with the proposers and members of the Student Affairs Committee identified challenges with the current policy, including the burden faced by students when notifying multiple instructors about a bereavement absence and the mixed level of responses received from each instructor.





- Students we spoke with expressed further challenges when the loss is not a "family member."
- Some students indicated that instructors' support for a grieving student may vary depending on the student's relationship with the individual who passed away, leading to inconsistent treatment based on the nature of the relationship.
- Only a few students acknowledged awareness of the appeal process listed in the policy or other resources available to help.





- Additionally, the proposal asked that the Senate define a minimum number of days that students are eligible for when requesting an excused absence for bereavement.
- Many members of the UMD community acknowledged the difficulty of quantifying a minimum number of days permitted in a policy, since everyone's experience with grief is unique and individuals experience grief in a non-linear manner.





- The open-ended structure of the current policy was identified through our consultations as the best option to ensure that there is flexibility provided to meet students' individual needs while accounting for the unique structures and demands of each course.
- Several constituents highlighted the importance of providing both students and faculty with better guidance of resources to utilize rather than revise the policy to include a specific number of days given for a bereavement absence.





- It is important to note the sensitive nature of this proposal and the way in grief impacts our campus community.
- During committee discussions, members shared their personal experiences with a loss of a loved one, recalling emotions ranging from numbness, a mental dissonance, shock, and apathy towards daily life.
- The experience of grief is life changing.





- Since grief is distinct from other types of absences, members felt strongly that expanding the policy to specifically mention bereavement as an excused absence was necessary.
- This ensures that students receive the support they need in these vulnerable moments while still allowing for the flexibility needed in different academic contexts.
- This modification would validate the experience of grief, but does so without introducing unnecessary complexity.





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- Members also quickly agreed that the definition of "family" in the policy should be expanded to better reflect students' lives and the diverse relationships that support their well-being, ensuring a more holistic understanding during times of grief.
- This revision will make the policy more inclusive and responsive to the diverse needs of the student population, ensuring all students receive appropriate accommodations during bereavement.





- Based on stakeholder feedback and committee discussions, members concluded that the current policy needed revisions in two areas:
 - Explicitly including bereavement as an excused absence rather than including it as an example of a "compelling reason"
 - Expanding the definition of "family" to be more inclusive.



- The committee also deliberated at length about the need for supporting documentation.
- In speaking with representatives across campus, it was determined that some documentation is necessary.
- It was noted that the policy does currently allow one health-related absence without documentation.
- The committee recommends that this exception be broadened beyond health-related absences to be appropriate for any absence.



 The Academic Procedures and Standards Committee recommends that the proposed revisions to the University of Maryland Policy on Excused Absence (V-1.00(G)), as shown in the report be accepted.
