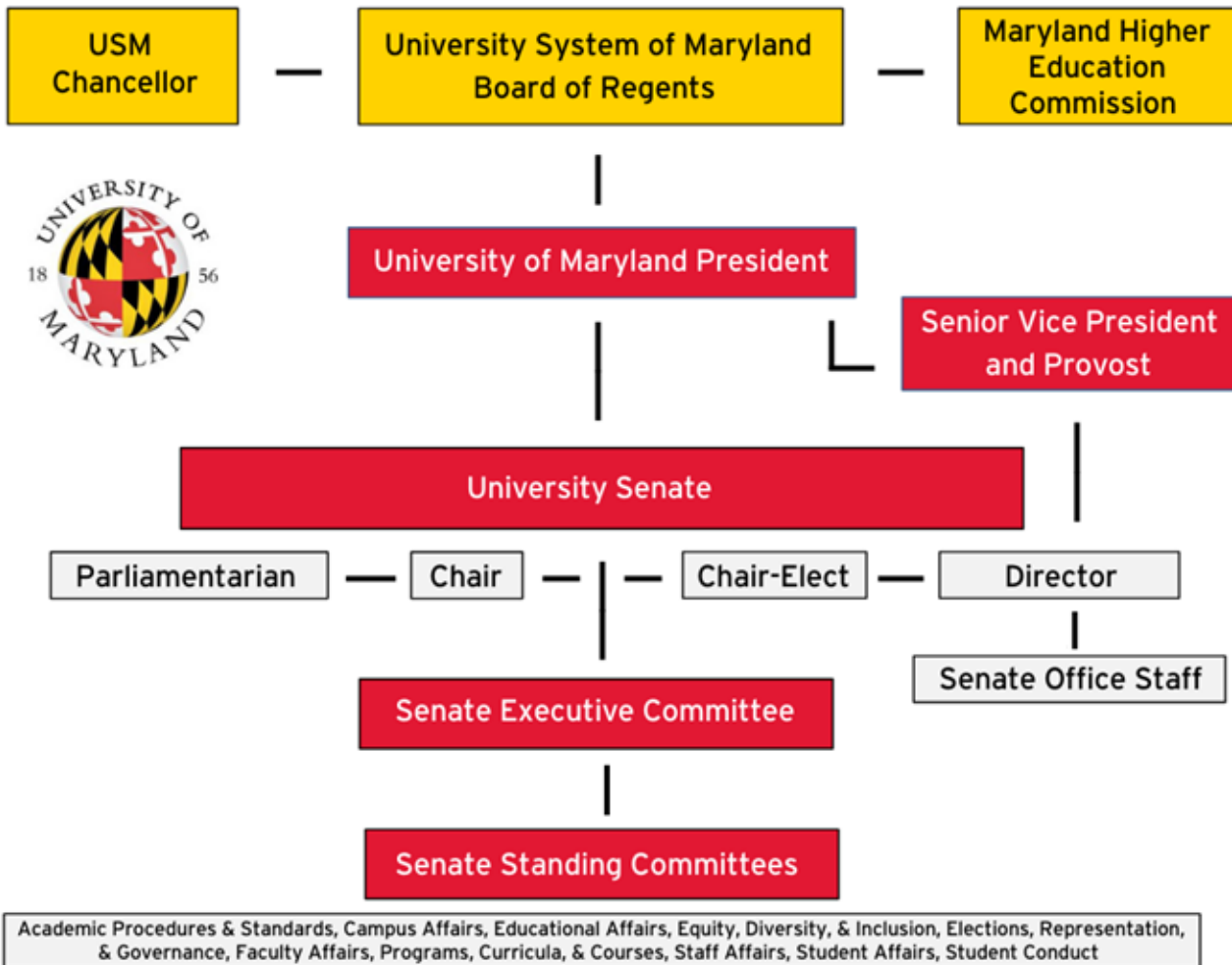

Meetings

The Senate meets four or five times per semester (typically once a month), with special meetings scheduled as necessary. The materials for Senate meetings are made available to the public via the Senate website one week prior to each scheduled meeting. The Senate Chair presides over each meeting. All Senate meetings are open to the public, but only Senators may actively participate and vote at the meetings. The majority of Senate meetings will be held virtually via Zoom, with the exception of the two meetings where President Pines will deliver his State of the Campus Address. Those meetings will be held in person in the Colony Ballroom of the Stamp Student Union but a virtual option will be offered for those who need it.

Research Council Report: Interim Malign Foreign Talent Recruitment Program Policy (Senate Document #24-25-04) (Action)

- The Research Council was charged with reviewing the interim Malign Foreign Talent Recruitment Program policy in September 2024.



Research Council Report: Interim Malign Foreign Talent Recruitment Program Policy (Senate Document #24-25-04) (Action)

- The policy was created in response to the 2022 CHIPS and Science Act and new policies at federal funding agencies.
 - The CHIPS and Science Act prohibits researchers on federal grants from participating in malign foreign talent recruitment programs.
 - Higher education institutions must certify that their researchers are in compliance.



Research Council Report: Interim Malign Foreign Talent Recruitment Program Policy (Senate Document #24-25-04) (Action)

- A malign foreign talent recruitment program is a program that is sponsored by a foreign government that provides compensation or benefits to a researcher in exchange for their participation in certain activities or services.



Research Council Report: Interim Malign Foreign Talent Recruitment Program Policy (Senate Document #24-25-04) (Action)

- Might require a researcher to share research data or provide intellectual property to the foreign government.
- Secretive.
- Usually involve a contractual agreement with the researcher.



Research Council Report: Interim Malign Foreign Talent Recruitment Program Policy (Senate Document #24-25-04) (Action)

- The Research Council reviewed background information on:
 - federal laws, regulations, and funding agency requirements; and
 - policies at peer institutions, including Big 10 institutions.



Research Council Report: Interim Malign Foreign Talent Recruitment Program Policy (Senate Document #24-25-04) (Action)

- Found that peers have policies that are very similar to UMD, with the same requirements and specific language from CHIPS and Science Act.
- The Council consulted with a wide range of administrators and administrative offices.



Research Council Report: Interim Malign Foreign Talent Recruitment Program Policy (Senate Document #24-25-04) (Action)

- The Research Security Office noted that much of the policy language is specifically pulled from the CHIPS and Science Act or the related Office of Science and Technology Policy Guidelines for compliance purposes.
- The Council found no reported problems with the policy, nor were there any requests for revisions to the policy.



Research Council Report: Interim Malign Foreign Talent Recruitment Program Policy (Senate Document #24-25-04) (Action)

- A check for malign foreign talent recruitment programs have been incorporated into inTERP, the research security training, and the Kualu Research proposal routing process.



Research Council Report: Interim Malign Foreign Talent Recruitment Program Policy (Senate Document #24-25-04) (Action)

- The Research Council had concerns about whether faculty and graduate students will understand what types of activities would constitute a malign foreign talent recruitment program.
- The Research Council felt that informational materials should be developed to spread awareness about malign foreign talent recruitment programs and this policy.



Research Council Report: Interim Malign Foreign Talent Recruitment Program Policy (Senate Document #24-25-04) (Action)

- The Research Council identified a few minor inconsistencies between the definitions in this policy and the University's COI/COC Policy.
- The Research Council is recommending minor revisions to the Policy to bring the definitions back into alignment.



Research Council Report: Interim Malign Foreign Talent Recruitment Program Policy (Senate Document #24-25-04) (Action)

- The Research Council voted online to approve the recommendations.
- The Research Council moves that the proposed revisions to the Interim Malign Foreign Talent Recruitment Program Policy and associated recommendation be approved.

INTERIM POLICY #25-26-18

Proposed Policy

PROCEDURES REGARDING THE WEARING OF APPROVED HELMETS ON UNIVERSITY ROADWAYS AND BIKEWAYS

- A. An approved Helmet must be worn at all times while operating a Micromobility Vehicle on University property.
- B. Failure to wear a Helmet will result in:
 - a. Referral to the Office of Student Conduct for undergraduate and graduate students;
 - b. Referral to appropriate management for faculty and staff members; or
 - c. A verbal warning for those unaffiliated with the University.



CAMPUS TRANSPORTATION ADVISORY COMMITTEE

Purpose

- Advises Vice President & Chief Administrative Officer on transportation issues, including:
 - Parking and mandatory student fee proposals
 - DOTS or other university policies that impact campus transportation
 - Implementation of longstanding and/or emerging industry best practices

Membership

- From the University Senate: three faculty, two exempt staff, two non-exempt staff, one Staff Affairs Committee member, one Campus Affairs Committee member, one undergraduate student at-large
- SGA, GSG and RHA hold seven additional seats



CTAC REVIEWED & DISCUSSED THE CHARGE

Charge

1. **Review** the proposal, charge, and Big 10 benchmarking
2. **Consult** with stakeholders
3. **Consider** data, impact of codifying this policy, other regional/local policies

December 3, 2026

- Introduced the bill
- Reviewed the interim policy, proposed policy, and Senate charge

February 23, 2026

- Subject-matter expert perspectives from UMPD and DOTS

CTAC'S RECOMMENDATION

Final Decision & Recommendations

Decision: CTAC unanimously recommended removal of the interim policy

Recommendation: UMD should prioritize infrastructure investments and adopt a Safe System Approach to achieve the policy's stated goals of reducing the frequency and severity of head injuries and nurturing a safety-first culture at UMD.

10. Faculty Affairs Committee Report: Instructional and Teaching PTK Faculty Workload Policy (Senate Document#24-25-15) (Action)

Instructional and Teaching PTK Faculty Workload Policy (Senate Document#24-25-15) (Action)

- Background:
- In Fall of 2024, the Proposal for Instructional and Teaching PTK Faculty Workload Policy was submitted to the University Senate Office on behalf of the Office of Faculty Affairs.
- The purpose of this proposal is to establish a University-wide workload policy for instructional professional track (PTK) faculty to provide for a more equitable and consistent workload distribution.



**Instructional and Teaching PTK Faculty Workload Policy
(Senate Document#24-25-15) (Action)**

- Currently, the University's existing workload policy focuses on tenured and tenure-track faculty, without specifically addressing the diverse responsibilities of instructional PTK faculty, who, depending on a signed responsibilities, may engage in teaching, research, administrative, service, and other duties.



**Instructional and Teaching PTK Faculty Workload Policy
(Senate Document#24-25-15) (Action)**

- The Faculty Affairs Committee began their review of the proposal in January 2025, after being charged by the Senate Executive Committee (SEC) with express review, consultation, and consideration of elements.



**Instructional and Teaching PTK Faculty Workload Policy
(Senate Document#24-25-15) (Action)**

- The committee began by reviewing the relevant policy and procedures documents (both USM and University-level), including the existing workload policy designed for Tenure-Tenured/Track Faculty entitled (II-1.25(A)).



**Instructional and Teaching PTK Faculty Workload Policy
(Senate Document#24-25-15) (Action)**

- Ex-officio representative for the Office of Faculty Affairs presented to the committee on PTK Faculty Reviews and Actions.
- Details were shared on a PTK Advisory Group and additional context and background on the draft Instructional PTK Workload Policy.



**Instructional and Teaching PTK Faculty Workload Policy
(Senate Document#24-25-15) (Action)**

- The committee noted throughout discussion that the proposed policy is a University policy, which is high-level policy work, and guidelines and specific implementations for units across campus must be developed to fit more specific needs.



**Instructional and Teaching PTK Faculty Workload Policy
(Senate Document#24-25-15) (Action)**

- The committee also completed Big10 research on similar policies at peer institutions in the Big10 academic alliance.
- Members noted an incredible variant in the Big10 peer groups as it relates to PTK Faculty, workload and policy.



Instructional and Teaching PTK Faculty Workload Policy (Senate Document#24-25-15) (Action)

- The committee elected to revise select portions of the proposed policy and discussed and submitted revisions for sections IV and V during the Spring of 2026. These amendments included;
- An adjustment in the percentage of teaching activities, to ensure that faculty are not unduly burdened by service responsibilities.



**Instructional and Teaching PTK Faculty Workload Policy
(Senate Document#24-25-15) (Action)**

- Clarity in language around when units are expected to develop initial workload policies
- Clarifications on how concerns with unit-level policies are handled



**Instructional and Teaching PTK Faculty Workload Policy
(Senate Document#24-25-15) (Action)**

- The proposed policy, with the committee amendments, was approved at the March 25, 2026, Faculty Affairs Committee Meeting.
- The Office of General Counsel was consulted regarding the policy and did not have additional revisions, representing approval of the draft policy on April 14, 2026.



**Instructional and Teaching PTK Faculty Workload Policy
(Senate Document#24-25-15) (Action)**

- The Faculty Affairs Committee recommends that Instructional and Teaching PTK Faculty Workload Policy (Senate Document #24-25-15) be approved by the Senate.
